Children learn that their behaviour has an impact on their rights and those of others. <ul> <li>lower down in school by listening to them read, supporting them in PE or encouraging positive play at lunch and break times.</li> <li>We warmly welcome all visitors and newly arrived children and their families from all over the world.</li> <li>All members of the school community treat each other with respect.</li> <li>Our recommended read books promote mutual respect.</li> <li>Year 6 go on a visit to Undercliffe Cemetery to pay their respects to local people who fought in wars.</li> <li>Visits to the Old People's Home – local.</li> <li>We hold various themed days and events in school throughout the year to promote mutual respect. For example – we have a Mixed Day and a Day of Culture where we celebrate our rich, diverse heritage.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>assemblies teach children about trust, respect and honesty. We encourage children to develop a strong sense of morality; knowing right from wrong and doing the right thing even when it is difficult.</li> <li>We Use Picture News for many of our assemblies and for discussion in class and British Values are a big part of this.</li> <li>We ensure children understand laws are made in parliament and explore how these laws are made. We invite a local MP to school to lead an assembly.</li> <li>We plan visits from authorities such as the Police, Fire Service etc. regularly to help reinforce The Rule of Law.</li> <li>Year 6 take part in a programme of education led by the Police based on Community Engagement. Topics such as knife crime, anti-social behaviour and peer pressure are covered.</li> <li>Year 6 also take part in a gangs workshop led by a former Probation Officer.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>We teach children to respect the rights of others and things through the values of empathy and tolerance, as well as understanding and knowledge.</li> <li>The theme of 'individual liberty' is embedded into our broad and balanced curriculum. For example, Year 5 complete work in history on the Suffragette movement.</li> <li>We celebrate Black History Month in October, children learn about the past and the importance of freedom, the right to equality and free choice. Each class learns about a different historic figure who have promoted this.</li> <li>We completed a heritage homework campaign based on 'Which significant individual, linked to Bradford, do you think deserves a statue in Peel Park?'</li> <li>Year 5 and 6 look at Fair Trade in Geography.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Children visit places of worship that are important to different faiths.</li> <li>Through our RE curriculum children learn about different religions, their beliefs, places of worship and festivals.</li> <li>Our Year 5 children visit the Gurdwara as part of their RE curriculum.</li> <li>Children learn about different societies and cultures through geography and history.</li> <li>Assemblies mark and celebrate significant religious festivals and current affairs. Picture news highlights any current affairs and topical issues.</li> <li>We celebrate difference through music and dance at Peel Park. Year 5 visit Kala Sangam to take part in a bhangra dance workshop.</li> <li>We study the music of other cultures through our music curriculum.
